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Free Community Gynecologic Cancer Education Event Hosted by Rutgers New Jersey Medical School and the Essex-Passaic Wellness Coalition

Join medical experts and cancer survivors at a **free symposium** on **Tuesday**, **July 22**, **2014** to learn the facts about gynecologic cancer. All are welcome to join the Essex-Passaic Wellness Coalition, sponsored by Rutgers New Jersey Medical School (NJMS), at United Way, 60 South Fullerton Ave., Montclair, NJ 07042.

Event moderator, Stanley H. Weiss, MD, professor of Preventive Medicine and Community Health at NJMS and director of the Essex-Passaic Wellness Coalition, noted that "Gynecologic cancers remain a major disease in our community, with many preventable deaths. This free conference for the general public is designed to help our community prevent and control these devastating diseases."

Following a **free dinner at 5:30PM**, there will be two brief lectures and a series of round tables focusing on prevention and detection, ending at 8:00PM. Gynecologic oncologist Robert R. Taylor, MD, FACOG, FACS, from Gyn Cancer & Pelvic Surgery, LLC (Barnabas Health) and Imelda De Vera Guimary, APN, (University Hospital Newark), will speak about the five main types of gynecologic cancer: cervical, ovarian, uterine, vaginal and vulvar. They will address the warning signs and symptoms, risk factors, screening and prevention methods, cervical cancer vaccines and treatment options. The round-table discussions will be led by medical experts as well as cancer survivors.

According to Ms. Carole Fagella, 7-year survivor of ovarian cancer, a patient educator with the Pathways Women's Cancer Teaching Project and a U.S. congressional lobbyist for ovarian cancer initiatives, "It is very important for women to know their own bodies and the signs and symptoms of ovarian cancer. There are no screening tests and no reliable biomarkers so women need to be educated to know how to detect potential disease early to gain medical help towards making a diagnosis at earlier stages." Ms. Lesley Adams, project manager at Pathways, added, "As someone who works with brave women living with gynecologic cancers, I really believe in the power of and the need for education on this important women's health issue. I believe we are truly making a difference."
