## Dean Robert L. Johnson to receive Desmond Tutu Phelophepa Achievement Award for Excellence

**November 24, 2015,** New York, NY – The American Friends of the Phelophepa Train (AFPT) is hosting its annual awards benefit gala on **Monday, November 30, 2015** at Guastavino's in New York, starting at 6 P.M. This year's gala recognizes the achievements of global leaders in health, cultural arts, business, humanities, and philanthropy.

Dr. Robert L. Johnson, The Sharon and Joseph Muscarelle Endowed Dean, Rutgers New Jersey Medical School (NJMS), is among the award recipients. He is the eighth Dean of NJMS, the oldest medical school in New Jersey. Dean Johnson will be recognized for his expertise and accomplishments in adolescent physical and mental health, adolescent HIV, adolescent violence, adolescent sexuality, and family strengthening. He is a well-known spokesperson on adolescent issues, frequently addressing local, state, national, and international audiences. Widely published, Dr. Johnson maintains an active schedule of teaching, research, and patient care.

Funds raised at this year's dinner will help establish the third Phelophepa Train, called Phelophepa III, which will serve as a surgical facility and become operational in 2018. "We have never been able to offer any surgical services to the patients, which has been a great concern and a dire need," says Cathe Kruger, AFPT Executive Vice President (Ex Officio). "Imagine the excitement of people living in desolate impoverished communities when a new surgical train arrives to do cataract operations, giving thousands of legally blind people a new day of light and sight." While the new train is being constructed, the organization will add a car to the two existing Phelophepa Trains in 2016 to begin providing cataract surgeries.

The Phelophepa trains house a health clinic, pharmacy clinic, educational clinic, dental clinic, eye clinic, and psychology clinic. In addition, each clinic has an outreach program that visits surrounding areas and schools, to reach those who may not be able to make it to the train. The trains travel throughout rural impoverished areas of South Africa and are often referred to by patients as the "Trains of Hope." Staff includes doctors, nurses, dentists, pharmacists, and counselors.

Gala participants will include international dignitaries, American film industry celebrities, and local and national socialites. Performers from "The Lion King" will provide entertainment; a fashion show by designer Sergio Alain Barrios (SAB), featuring a collection of men's and women's clothing created from African textiles, will follow.

Past support for this project was provided by President Nelson Mandela, UN Secretary-General Kofi Annan, NYC Mayor Michael Bloomberg, and President Bill Clinton.
